VICE-PROVINCE OF
COSTA RICA





With a look full of enthusiasm and hope for the future of the small Vice-Province of Costa Rica, on 11 December we began a day of visits to our Vice-Province of Costa Rica by Fr Nélio Pereira, CM who is General Assistant to Fr Tomaž Mavrič, CM Superior General of the Congregation of the Mission. Nélio shared this first day with the formation community of St. Vincent de Paul Seminary in an atmosphere of dialogue and closeness between seminarians and missionary formators. He also visited the community of Bajo Zamora, in Purral de Guadalupe, where the Casita de Misión is located, a centre of apostolate of our formation house and Vincentian laity.



During the second day of the visit of Fr. Nélio Pereira, CM, a meeting was held with the administrative and economic team of the Seminary College where they discussed the improvements in infrastructure, academic offerings and the sports program of the institution, as well as the challenges and future projects of this educational centre that has 130 years of history in Costa Rica. In addition, during the afternoon, a visit was made to the Casa la Milagrosa of the Company of the Daughters of Charity in Alajuelita, in San José Costa Rica, where Fr. Nélio presided the Holy Eucharist, and then shared in an atmosphere of familiarity and dialogue with our sisters the Daughters of Charity, as if they were old acquaintances.

Nélio Pereira, CM presented in greater detail the projects of the Congregation of the Mission in Costa Rica as part of the process of consolidation of our works and apostolates.

In addition, last Thursday, December 14, the First Meeting of Seminarians of Costa Rica-Mexico-Panama was held at the San Vicente de Paul Seminary, San José, Costa Rica. Daniel Blanco, Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of San José, who presided the prayer of Lauds and the Holy Eucharist. Nélio Pereira CM, confreres of the Vice-Province, representatives of the Board of Directors of AIC and people affiliated to the Congregation of the Mission.

As part of the agenda of visits, the Assistant General visited the missionary work of Talamanca in the indigenous area of Costa Rica, where there is a local community made up of two confreres and a student admitted to the CM. During this visit, Fr. Nélio Pereira CM presided the sending Mass for the Costa Rican, Panamanian and Mexican seminarians, as well as for the group of young missionaries who accompanied this year's Advent Mission, animating fourteen indigenous communities with the traditional Christmas "posadas". The mission began on 15 December and ended on Friday 23 December with the celebration of the Eucharist of thanksgiving for the experience of faith.

The last of Fr. Nélio Pereira CM's visits was to the local community in the Parish of San Judas Tadeo de Chomes in the Diocese of Puntarenas, a coastal area bathed by the waters of the Pacific Ocean, where many of its inhabitants are engaged in artisanal fishing in the Gulf of Nicoya, but at the same time an area marked by unemployment. In this mission community the Assistant General held interviews where the confreres expressed some of the needs and social realities that affect the community.

It is worth noting that this meeting with Fr. Nélio Pereira CM in the framework of the Advent Mission and the Meeting of Seminarians of the Provinces of Costa Rica-Mexico-Panama has enriched the dynamics of the life of the Vice-Province in many of its dimensions, from the administrative-organisational to the community life, the apostolate of the mission and the *raison d'être* of our vocation, the following of Jesus Christ, Evangeliser of the poor, which is the common factor that unites us all, confreres, seminarians and lay Vincentians in the same feeling and which makes us definitely see ourselves as the family of Christ and St. Vincent de Paul.

JÁN HAVLÍK - MARTYR BECAUSE HE WAS A HEROIC WITNESS TO THE FAITH

On 30 March 2023, nine theologian consultors of the Dicastery for the Causes of Saints cast a positive and unanimous vote on the martyrdom of the Servant of God Ján Havlík. After this initial approval came the next step, the convocation of the Ordinary Session of the Dicastery, held in recent days, during which all the cardinals and bishops members of the Dicastery were called upon to express their opinion on the Cause of the Servant of God and its importance for the whole Church.

On 14 December 2023, the Prefect of the Dicastery for the Causes of Saints, Card. Marcello Semeraro, submitted the conclusions of the Ordinary Session for the approval of the Supreme Pontiff. The Holy Father definitively confirmed the opinion of the Session and ordered the Dicastery to promulgate the Decree on the martyrdom of the Servant of God Ján Havlík. From this moment on, with the approval of his martyrdom, we can call him by the title of "Venerable Servant of God".

Ján Havlík, a student of the seminary of the Congregation of the Mission, occupies a special place among those who bore heroic witness to their faith in the not so distant times of the communist dictatorship in Slovakia. As a novice and seminarian of the Congregation of the Mission, he always had a great desire and a strong will to study and become a priest. In May 1950, the communists intensified their persecution of the Church and, after closing the novitiate, transferred the novices for political indoctrination and invited them to work for the state.

Ján Havlík continued his training for the priesthood clandestinely under the guidance of the superiors of the Congregation of the Mission. Discovered by the communists, they were all arrested. The new Venerable was sentenced to 14 years' imprisonment, which was later reduced to 10 years on the false charge of high treason. With great courage, he admitted that he had carried out evangelistic activities among his fellow prisoners: this earned him a further stiffening of the sentence and an additional year of imprisonment. Nevertheless, he remained steadfast in his vocation and remained faithful until death, even at the cost of eleven years in prison. A great testimony to the vow of stability in the priestly and missionary vocation in the Congregation of the Mission. It has been shown that the harsh living conditions and hard labour contributed to a steady deterioration of his health, which led to severe heart failure, without adequate care. His health also progressively deteriorated due to the administration of drugs by his jailers. He was released on 29 October 1962, having served his entire sentence and by then reduced to death. He died on 27 December 1965 in Skalica (Slovakia), three years after his release, as a result of physical and mental ill-treatment during his imprisonment. The Diocesan Historical Commission of Inquiry into his martyrdom proved beyond doubt the direct link between the sufferings he endured and his death: he died as a martyr for the faith.

Ján Havlík is an extraordinary example not only for the Slovak Church, but for all Catholics, indeed for all Christians and for those who defend human dignity, especially freedom of conscience. His example is a call to witness for those who believe and out of false human respect hide in invisibility.

As we await the date of the beatification of the Venerable Servant of God Ján Havlík, we ask for his intercession to obtain from the Lord the graces we desire:

"Heavenly Father, in your immense goodness, you offer us the way of salvation through service to others. In the times that your providence has ordained, you have called willing people and sent them on the way of love to proclaim the Gospel. Your servant Jan Havlik also clearly heard your voice and sowed in his heart the seed of love which, following the example of Christ, blossomed into self-denial, firm faith and immense devotion. We ask for the gift to glorify him in heaven so that he may become a great and holy model for the people of all present and future generations. From his simple but spiritually rich and heroically imbued life, may we better perceive your great love for us and, through his intercession, may we be able to offer our lives to you each day. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

“GIVE ME 5”

“Give me 5” is a series by the Vincentians of the Eastern Province, USA, and appears in its newsletter. Five random questions are posed to an Eastern Province Priest, Brother, or Seminarian.

Fr. Joseph Ita-Sam, CM, serves the Germantown neighborhood in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, at Saint Vincent de Paul Church. The community is diverse in every sense.

Born in Nigeria, his journey as a Vincentian has taken him far. In addition to being a Vincentian, he’s a therapist, holding a master’s degree in Marriage and Family Therapy from La Salle University. He’s worked at Saint Vincent’s, located just to the Southwest of the university, since 2018.

Let’s learn a little about his experiences with these five questions:

1.

What can you say about the people you serve in your community in the Germantown neighborhood of Philadelphia?

“We have the black, white, Latino, and other populations. So it's diverse in culture but also in ideology in the sense that the people we serve, they are people from different backgrounds and different understandings,” Fr. Joseph said. “Sometimes, it makes the work a little bit complex, but it's very good because it opens the mind for every other possibility and learning.”

“Though, you can never say that you totally understand other people's culture. So, I tried to see how much I could step in and not allow [differences in] culture to be a barrier for my service to them.”

2.

What would you say is your community's greatest need?

“In looking at Germantown as a whole, it's not about what people could get because we have a lot of resources, but we need personnel that can send those resources out to people so that they can be able to benefit from those resources.”

3.

What inspired you to become a Vincentian?

“When I finished high school, I was into music and I was working with a music team at one of the Vincentian Retreats in Lagos in 2002. So I learned a great deal about them from being with that music team. I got to know the Vincentians and see the good works their priests did in Lagos: to go out, see the poor, give food.”

“The work they did inspired me a lot and I said to myself, ‘Oh, this is what you can do to make a contribution to humanity.’”

“The Vincentians, are not a loud kind of people. They are just on the ground and they are doing good jobs.”



4.

With 400 years of Vincentian Brothers and Priests approaching, is it possible to put your contributions into that perspective?

“In my own little capacity, I see some of the things we do as seeds being planted. And definitely, I pray they’re going to grow. I may not be here to see it grow or see it mature.”

“Some of our brothers whose seeds were planted 400 years ago, it is something we are reaping today. So I just look for the little effort we do manifests.”

You have a healthy social media following. What would you say to a Priest, Brother, Sister, or average person who wants to build a presence?

“Everyone that wants to begin, please start. Just begin,” Fr. Ita-Sam said. You do not need to get the best video camera and the best editing machine. No. Just begin.”

“There is no perfect video out there. Don’t think, ‘This has to be the best.’ The best video out there is the one that makes an impact on someone’s life.”

“What is most important is we use social media in a proper way to make meaning to others and not to be destructive.”

Dear Brothers and Sisters

On the occasion of the 400th anniversary of the gift of the charism of the Vincentian Family in St. Peter's Square, Pope Francis told us "...I would like to come to you with a few words of gratitude and encouragement and to emphasize the value and timeliness of St. Vincent de Paul. He lived always on a journey, open to the search for God and for himself...Inflamed by the desire to make Jesus known to the poor, he dedicated himself intensely to proclamation, especially through the popular missions, and taking special care of the formation of priests...he cared for the most needy by living in communion and joyfully making his goods available, with the certainty that Jesus and the poor are the precious treasure, and that, as he liked to repeat, 'when you go to the poor you meet Jesus'..."

The synthesis of the Vincentian charism elaborated by the Pontiff challenges the sons of St. Vincent de Paul living in the third millennium: how to incarnate this charism in the present time of history? Undoubtedly, the times are changing, society, the way of life, the way of thinking are changing. Does this mean that the Congregation of the Mission must also change? I think that this conclusion is not acceptable. The necessary perspective is that of a proper "adaptive renewal", not merely "change". Indeed, the process of renewal, of adaptation to a temporary situation includes a certain continuity; this is not always the case in the process of change.

I am convinced that the Saints and Blesseds of the Vincentian Family show in the most beautiful way the example of that "renewal". Their witness shows that it is possible to live our charism "in fullness" even today. In the right way and at the right time: also today. To continue to present to the veneration of all God's holy people the eminent figures of holiness who come from our Family, who have radically lived the beatitude of the Gospel, serving the poor Lords, as our Founder often called them.

In the Congregation of the Mission, the office of Procurator General has existed since 1843, created at the express request of the Pontiff. From the time of the foundation, there was a representative of the Superior General, from the 18th century onwards often called Procurator in the Curia, to distinguish him from the Procurator in Paris who was the Econome General.

Until the end of the 19th century, the Congregation did not have a Postulator General for the Causes of Saints. In fact, apart from the cause of beatification and canonisation of the Founder - which was taken care of by Couty, Vieillescases, Cossart - the Congregation of the Mission did not wish to initiate other causes of canonisation.

Gradually, the appointment of Procurator General also brought with it - sometimes implicitly, then more and more explicitly - that of Postulator General for the Causes of Saints.

One wonders what were the motivations behind this reluctance - almost a disguised hostility - to proceed with the evaluation and presentation of the many outstanding figures who have borne witness in the Congregation of the Mission; and what were the causes that finally unblocked this situation. The Society had no intention of encouraging the processes of beatification and canonisation of its members, in order to preserve the spirit of humility that the whole Congregation should pursue. This mentality, despite the very partial interpretation of the spirit of humility of the Congregation of the Mission, spread everywhere and for a long time. It was only in 1931 that the question raised in 1834 about the possibility of initiating causes of beatification and canonisation was taken up again and, in the light of the signs of the times, made it possible to overcome the aforementioned provision, which was to be considered out of date. The new orientation was presented in the circular letter of the Postulator General Francis Verdier, dated 1 January 1931.

THE TASKS OF THE POSTULATOR

The postulators, by their work, have the task of contributing to making the example of the baptised who have lived and given witness to evangelical radicalism shine forth. Therefore, in their service they are called to be, as Pope Francis says: "...ever more aware that their function requires an attitude of service to the truth and cooperation with the Holy See...flee from anything that is in contradiction with the meaning of the ecclesial work they carry out...". ...that the Postulators never cease to be aware that the Causes of beatification and canonisation are realities of a spiritual character; not only procedural, but spiritual...and must therefore be treated with a marked evangelical sensitivity and moral rigour...".

Therefore, the service of the Postulator is central to the whole process of beatification and canonisation, we could say that he is its soul. His function is threefold: procedural, economic-administrative and liturgical. But I would say that the Postulator's main task is, therefore, first and foremost the search for the truth, conscientiously and honestly, without omitting anything that might relate in any way to the cause, in the conviction that the success of the process depends to a large extent on having been properly instructed. Indeed, the interest of the Church and of the Postulator himself is to proclaim the holiness of those who enjoy God's vision and deserve to be proposed as models and intercessors. This quest involves getting at the truth about the life, the virtues, the offering of one's life or martyrdom, and the reputation for holiness and favour of the servant of God, leaving no aspect in the shadows.

To carry out this task well, I ask for the collaboration of all the members of the Vincentian Family. In this way we can ensure that "Vincentian holiness" has the opportunity to shine more effectively in this world.

THE INAUGURATION OF 4TH CENTENARY IN SOUTH INDIAN PROVINCE, MYSORE



The Southern Indian Province (SIP) inaugurated the 4th centenary of the Foundation of the Congregation of the Mission (CM) on January 25, 2024, in the presence of a large number of Confreres and Vincentian family members. Two days of workshops to revitalise our Vincentian identity and Charism facilitated a conducive atmosphere for the inauguration of the 4th Centenary celebrations.

The first day of the workshop began with the Eucharistic celebration led by Rev. Fr. Anil Thomas CM, the Visitor of SIP, in which he exhorted the Confreres to transform these privileged moments into special moments of encounter with the Lord, a fountain of abundant blessings, and a source of innumerable graces for personal transformation and rededication in their Vincentian ministerial commitments. The workshop began with the sharing of Fr. Basil Thottamkara CM, a pioneering missionary in north-east India. He emphasised the necessity of deepening our love for the Word of God and the Holy Eucharist for an effective Vincentian missionary life. He said, "I faced enormous challenges in the mission, especially under insurgency, but what kept me going was my trust in the providence of God and His protection". Rt. Rev. Bishop Varghese Thottamkara CM, the Bishop of Balasore, expounded on the motto CM "Evangelizare pauperibus misit me" in the light of three decades of Vincentian missionary experience in Ethiopia and India as a Vincentian Priest and Bishop. He exhorted the confreres to embrace the missionary mandate wholeheartedly and explore the joy of involving themselves in direct evangelization ministries on our land and aboard. The day was concluded with various relaxing activities like a cricket match, Vincentian Quiz, basketball match, swimming and a fire camp with delicious dinner to strengthen the bonding among the Confreres.



Fr. Paul Pudussery CSC, an educationist, researcher, and lawyer, guided the Confreres through the second-day workshop. He invited the participants to be alert and watchful of the socio-political scenario of the country and be adequately prepared to face the challenging times ahead. He cautioned us about the risks of being naïve in handling personal data and ministerial responsibilities. He encouraged us to be sufficiently informed about the emerging socio-political developments and be prepared for a diversification of ministries.

On January 25, 2024, the inauguration of the 4th centenary of the foundation of CM was coupled with Golden Jubilee celebrations of the Consecrated Life Rev.Bro. George Menappattupadical CM and the Sacerdotal Golden Jubilee Rev.Fr. Basil Thottamkara CM. His Excellency Rt.Rev.Dr. Varghese Thottamkara, CM, presided over the concelebrated Eucharist and unveiled the 4th centenary emblem. Through his homily, he exhorted the Confreres to revitalise our Vincentian identity and spirituality because, as Vincentians, through the instrumentality of St. Vincent, our Holy Founder, we are gifted with a unique Charism. The unique contribution of Vincentian spirituality and Vincentian Charism has immensely enriched the ecclesial life down through the last four centuries and can do the same today as well. The Golden Jubilarians were felicitated for the invaluable contributions to the 'little Company' and the church at large. The celebration was also marked by the release of two books on St. Vincent de Paul.
